We Can End Chronic Homelessness Now

The COVID-19 pandemic has forced us to confront the consequences of allowing homelessness to persist in our cities for far too long, writes Dr. Stephen Hwang, director of St. Michael's MAP Centre for Urban Health Solutions. The time has come to move beyond short-term solutions and take action to end chronic homelessness.

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A COVID-19 Testing Site for Indigenous Torontonians

St. Michael's Well Living House has partnered with two community organizations to open a COVID-19 testing site for Indigenous people. Dr. Janet Smylie, director of Well Living House, says the new centre will eliminate barriers experienced by Indigenous people accessing health care, and offer referrals and health and social supports geared to their needs.

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Saliva Tests Won't Be a Silver Bullet for COVID-19

While new methods like saliva tests could help with the backlog in COVID-19 testing, they won't be enough to fully solve the problem. Dr. Larissa Matukas, head of microbiology at St. Michael's Hospital, says policy-makers need to understand where cases are multiplying and shut them down by moving resources, including testing, to those areas.

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Helping Police Deal with Mental Health Crisis Calls

Sivi Joachim, a mental health nurse at St. Michael's Hospital, works with Toronto Police Services' Mobile Crisis Intervention Team to provide specialized training and help with mental-health crisis calls. COVID-19 has made the MCIT busier, she says, as people are feeling more stressed, fragmented, alone and suicidal.
