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GRATITUDE 10 RAISES OVER \$70K FOR BRAIN CANCER RESEARCH AT ST. MICHAEL'S

On April 1 singer-songwriter Hawksley Workman performed a concert to benefit the Gratitude 10 Festival, created by grateful patient Jane Brean to support brain cancer research at St. Michael's. The show included a video featuring St. Mike's neurologist Dr. Sunit Das, calls from Jane's family and friends and a Tragically Hip cover in honour of Gord Downie, who died of brain cancer in 2017. Through ticket sales and online donations, Jane and Hawksley raised over \$71,000, "This personal concert was a dream come true for me, and proof that if you ask for what you want, you just might get it. I'll never stop dreaming big and acting on my ideas. That's what truly living means to me," Jane says.

DID YOU KNOW?

- 1. St. Michael's has performed at least 60 'awake craniotomies' where the neurosurgery team stimulates the brain before removing a tumour.
- 2. St. Michael's was the first Toronto hospital to perform brain surgery using an amino acid that lights up brain tumours in bright fuchsia to make them easier to see and remove.
- 3. St. Michael's was the first hospital in the world to remove tumours by bi-nasal endoscopy, now the international standard in brain surgery.
